## Stars set their sights on Lord's showpiece

**N**atWest Trophy holders Gloucestershire have already made two astonishing comebacks in the competition this season and their fans could be forgiven for believing that their heroes will once again be crowned champions at Lord's.

Mark Alleyne's side thought they were out after a three-wicket defeat at the hands of Worcestershire, before it emerged that Kabir Ali had already turned out for the Worcs County Board XI.

The match was ordered to be replayed, and Gloucestershire duly booked their place in the fourth round with a five-run victory.

The holders again appeared to be being ushered towards the exit door by Leicestershire in round four, only for an astonishing collapse to see them secure their place in the quarter-finals of the tournament.

But their credentials are certain to be given a stern examination by Northamptonshire, who ended Yorkshire's participation in the competition in the last round.

Arguably the most entertaining tie of the round takes place at the Oval where Surrey are due to take on Lancashire.

Adam Hollioake's men had little trouble disposing of Sussex in the last round, but will have a much tougher task against the Red Rose county.

Mike Atherton and Andrew Flintoff, who have been ruled out of John Crawley's plans for much of the season so far because of their international commitments with England, will be included for the match in south London.

The current National League champions have struggled somewhat in the limited overs game this season, but they will have their eyes on the silverware on offer in the NatWest Trophy.

Warwickshire have home advantage over Glamorgan in their quarter-final showdown, and captain Neil Smith will be looking to pacemen Allan Donald and Ed Giddins to utilise their knowledge of the Edgbaston wicket.

Glamorgan spinner Robert Croft will be hoping the pitch offers some turn, while the home side's Ashley Giles has the ability to take advantage of any assistance offered by the wicket. The remaining tie of the round takes place at Lord's, the ground which will host the final at the end of August, where Middlesex take on Hampshire.

# Reprieved holders show staying power

**N**atWest Trophy holders Gloucestershire slipped through the back door and into the quarter-finals with a dramatic 10-run victory over Leicestershire at Grace Road.

The visitors snapped up the home side's last five wickets for just nine runs in 18 balls to snatch a sensational win when they looked to be heading for certain defeat.

From 191-5, needing 20 runs off the last five overs to win, Leicestershire collapsed to 200 all out with Ian Harvey taking three of the last five wickets to finish with 4-40.

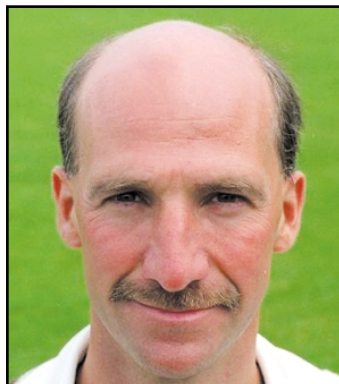
It completed an amazing 24 hours for Gloucestershire - having secured a narrow win over Worcestershire in the controversial replayed third-round tie on the previous day.

Opener Kim Barnett hit 86 after being dropped twice off the bowling of Chris Lewis before he had reached double figures and a bright and breezy 41 from Chris Taylor helped Gloucestershire to 210-8 after they had won the toss and decided to bat.

Gloucestershire's prize is a date with Northamptonshire - Michael Strong snapped up three key wickets in 20 balls at Wantage Road to help his county get past Yorkshire.

The 26-year-old former Sussex paceman, making his competition debut, dismissed Gary Fellows, Richard Blakey and Darren Lehmann on his way to 3-10 as the then County Championship leaders, needing 253, subsided to 183 all out and defeat by 69 runs.

Mark Butcher carried his bat as

Surrey cruised past Sussex at The Oval and into the last eight of the prestigious tournament.

England batsman Butcher dominated the rain-delayed fourth-round tie with an unbeaten 87 as Surrey triumphed by seven wickets to set up another home game, with Lancashire, in the quarter-finals.

Having been set 193 to win, Surrey reached 196-3 in 47.4 overs - with Butcher's superb innings coming from 146 balls with three fours in 209 minutes.

Middlesex cruised into the quarter-finals of English cricket's premier knock-out competition as they demolished Somerset by 169 runs in another rain delayed game at Southgate.

Somerset, who were bowled out for 58, never got going and at one stage were 9-4. Fast bowler Tim Bloomfield was the hero of the second morning

claiming four wickets for 17 runs.

Man-of-the-match Bloomfield dismissed Marcus Trescothick, Peter Bowler, Michael Burns and Ian Blackwell in a devastating opening attack with former England warhorse Angus Fraser.

Four of the Somerset card were dismissed without scoring and only all-rounder Keith Parsons made any headway with a bruising 23 before he was run out by the nimble Richard Johnson at mid-on.

Mark Ealham's heroics proved in vain at Canterbury as Kent were beaten by Glamorgan. An impressive burst of four wickets for three runs in 22 deliveries by Ealham was not enough as Glamorgan reached the quarter-finals, beating Kent by five wickets with more than 13 overs to spare.

A last-eight trip to Warwickshire was secured despite Ealham's 4-15 in a six-over spell assisted by three catches from Kent wicketkeeper Paul Nixon.

England one-day player Ashley Giles scored his first limited-overs century as Warwickshire overcame a brave Derbyshire challenge - led by opener Michael Di Venuto - to reach the last eight.

Giles powered Warwickshire to a formidable 257-8 from 50 overs as he raced to 107 off 97 balls with 12 fours and two sixes.

He eventually holed out to Dominic Cork at cover but then took his revenge on England's Test hero - catching the all-rounder on the cover boundary to make sure he did not repeat his match-winning performance

with the bat against the West Indies.

Hampshire went through after Steve Harmison conceded 34 runs in three overs to effectively hand the visitors a five-wicket win against Durham at Chester-le-Street.

Durham chose to bat and were all out for just 91 with the ball moving all over the place on a damp pitch.

No Hampshire bowler took more than two wickets, but John Stephenson won the man-of-the-match award for scoring 20 following his 2-31.

England pace hopeful Harmison came on with Hants 25 without loss. He bowled five wides and was hit for five fours - two more than in the entire Durham innings. Robin Smith saw his side home with 23 not out, but extras were easily the top scorer for both sides.

Sourav Ganguly and Mike Atherton continued their prolific NatWest Trophy form as Lancashire crushed Essex by 68 runs to move into the quarter-finals.

They followed an unbroken opening partnership of 193 in Lancashire's third-round win at Lincolnshire by adding another 163 stand inside 39 overs.

Atherton went first for 70, but Ganguly went on to 97 with four sixes to lay the platform for a Lancashire total of 251 for five.

Essex never really threatened to pull off an unlikely win despite 45 from Danny Law and were all out for 183 in the 43rd over. Leg-spinner Chris Schofield taking advantage of some loose hitting with 4-34.

## Preview – Tuesday 25th July

THE only hope Hampshire have of securing any silverware this season lies in the NatWest Trophy and they have an early opportunity to sample the atmosphere of Lord's, which will be hosting the final at the end of August.

After bringing in star names such as Australia's Shane Warne and England's Alan Mullally, the Hampshire hierarchy had high hopes of a season of success for their new-look side.

But while their bowling department has been strengthened substantially, the batting line-up is still weak, and there is an over-reliance on captain Robin Smith to provide runs.

There is little point in having match-winning bowlers if the batsman cannot provide them with a defendable total, as Hampshire have discovered to their cost this season.

They are currently the whipping boys of both Division One of the County Championship and Division Two of the National

League, and will have to put that form behind them if they are to progress in the NatWest competition.

Middlesex's form in the one-day game this season has been more promising and they remain in the running for promotion to Division One of the National League.

But their four-day performances still leave a lot to be desired and coach Mike Gatting will have his hands full to prevent Middlesex from finishing among the lower reaches of Division Two of the County Championship.

But with home advantage, Gatting's men will be favourites to progress to the last four of cricket's most prestigious knock-out tournament.

Middlesex turned in a superb performance in the fourth round as they demolished a hapless Somerset side by 165 runs.

After amassing 223-4 from their 50 overs, mainly thanks to an impressive unbeaten 71 from Paul Weekes, the Middlesex bowlers ripped into Somerset, dismissing them for a paltry 58 with Tim Bloomfield taking 4-17 from eight overs.

## Players to watch

● The left-handed Andrew Strauss has emerged as a star of the future this season and his contribution at the top of the order could have a major bearing on Middlesex's bid to secure a spot in the last four. The South Africa-born player's two outings in the NatWest Trophy so far this season have been impressive and his County Championship average of over 35 is also encouraging.

● Dimitri Mascarenhas' all-round talents are often overshadowed by the more publicised efforts of Shane Warne and Alan Mullally. But the 22-year-old, who bowls deceptively quick deliveries, has been one of the few consistent performers for Robin Smith's side this season. He has already claimed 14 County Championship wickets this term and five so far in the NatWest Trophy. His batting has suffered a little, but he has the talent to produce a crucial knock.

## Venue

● Lord's is, without doubt, the most impressive cricketing venue in this country and will be hosting the final of the NatWest Trophy. The most famous trait of the surface at Lord's is the slope which runs from the Grandstand side to the Tavern side of the ground. The drop in height across the pitch has been measured at seven feet.

### Preview – Tuesday 25th July (Live on Sky TV)

WARWICKSHIRE are still in with a chance of success on three fronts this season, but will not allow any other ambitions to get in the way of their quest for NatWest Trophy glory.

With just two games standing between Neil Smith's side and the final of the competition at Lord's, Warwickshire have an excellent opportunity to add some silverware to their trophy cabinet.

They are also riding high in Division Two of both the County Championship and National League and will be expecting to be back in the upper division of both tournaments next season.

Allan Donald is back in action after breaking his ribs at the start of the season and the South African paceman will be out to produce a top-drawer performance in front of the Edgbaston faithful.

Donald bagged four wickets in the fourth round triumph over

Derbyshire, while Ashley Giles and Dougie Brown both picked up two apiece.

Glamorgan have already suffered the agony of defeat in one Lord's final this season and will be determined to set the record straight in the NatWest.

They are just two victories away from a return to the home of cricket, where another win would ease the pain of their defeat at the hands of Gloucestershire on their last visit.

The Welsh county were indebted to the efforts of their bowlers in the fourth round as Kent were restricted to a total of just 121. Alex Wharf grabbed 3-18 from his 10 overs, while Owen Parkin, Adrian Dale and Robert Croft each picked up a brace of victims.

An unbeaten innings of 62 from opener Keith Newell saw Glamorgan to their target with ease, although they should not expect to dismiss Warwickshire as cheaply at Edgbaston.

Skipper Matthew Maynard, who was in the England party for the NatWest Series, was out for a duck in the last round and will be determined to make amends for that failure.

### Players to watch

● South Africa's success in the Test arena in recent years owes much to the superb pace bowling of Allan Donald. Nicknamed 'White Lightning', Donald has regularly terrorised batsmen at international level, and in the domestic game during his spells with Warwickshire. Now in the latter stages of his career, the 33-year-old can generate fearsome pace and has recovered well from a rib injury suffered at the start of the season.

● Robert Croft's talents could be the key factor for Glamorgan as they bid to secure a place in the semi-finals of the NatWest Trophy. The 30-year-old's off-spin has helped him gain international recognition with England at both one-day and Test level. His batting abilities cannot be ignored, and he has the ability to add a useful score when he comes in either at the top of the order, or with the tail, depending on the tactics employed by skipper Matthew Maynard.

### Venue

● The Birmingham crowd are certain to create a vibrant atmosphere for this mouth-watering quarter-final clash. The Edgbaston pitch should provide an even contest, giving assistance to both batsmen and bowlers alike. Despite the relatively low scoring Test matches that have taken place here in recent years, this one-day game should be played on a true surface.

## Preview – Wednesday 26th July

THE fact that NatWest Trophy holders Gloucestershire are still in the competition this season remains something of a minor miracle, and Northamptonshire will be hoping that the reigning champions have already used up all their luck.

Beaten in round three by Worcestershire, Mark Alleyne's men were given a second bite of the cherry when it was revealed that their opponents had fielded an ineligible player.

At the second attempt the holders made no mistake and set up a fourth round date with Leicestershire at Grace Road.

The home side appeared to have the victory in the bag as they were just 20 runs away from their target of 211 with five wickets in hand and five overs remaining.

But an astonishing collapse which saw Leicestershire all out for 200 ensured that Gloucestershire secured their place in the

### Player to watch

- Mark Alleyne is both an excellent captain and a superb all-round cricketer whose contribution to Gloucestershire's recent successes is immeasurable. He has been capped by England at one-day level after impressing with the 'A' side. But it is in the county game that Alleyne has made a real impact. ## THE DUCKWORTH/LEWIS SYSTEM

All NatWest Trophy matches have a reserve day, but if play is still lost to the weather the Duckworth Lewis system can be used to reset targets. The system is based on what percentage of its resources (overs and wickets) a team have left.

With 50 overs left and 10 wickets remaining, a team has 100 per cent of its resources left. The table shows the percentage of resources at other stages in the innings.

The procedure for working out targets is as follows:

- 1) For each innings: Use the table to calculate the resource percentage lost by the interruption and therefore calculate the resource percentage still available.
- 2) If team 2 have less resources available than team 1, calculate the ratio of the resources available to both teams. Team 2's revised target is obtained by scaling down team 1's score by this ratio.
- 3) If team 2 have more resources available than team 1, calculate the amount by which team 2's resources exceeds team 1's. Work this out as a percentage of 225 (the average 50-over score in ECB matches and one-day internationals). This gives the extra runs to add to team 1's score to give team 2's target.

## PLAYING CONDITIONS

- One innings per side of up to 50 overs. A maximum of 10 overs per bowler.
- Scheduled hours of play 11am to 6.45pm. Each innings scheduled to last a maximum three hours and 45 minutes. There will normally be two sessions of play of three hours and 30 minutes each, with an interval from 2.30pm to 3.25pm. The interval will be reduced if necessary.
- Two drinks intervals per innings, but these can be cancelled to make up time lost to interruptions.
- Fielding sides can be penalised for slow over rates by fines and by a reduction of overs in their own innings.
- For the first 15 overs a minimum of seven fielders plus the bowler and wicket-keeper must be inside the fielding circle as the ball is bowled. For the rest of the innings a minimum of four fielders plus the bowler and wicket-keeper must be inside the circle. The restrictions are lifted earlier when the number of overs is reduced.
- In the event of a tie, the team losing fewer wickets will win. If the sides are still level, the higher score after 15 overs will win.
- In rounds one and two, run rate may be used to set a revised target after a suspension of play. From round three onwards, the Duckworth Lewis system will be used.
