Competition hots up as big guns go head to head

The third round of the NatWest Trophy had it all - match winning performances with bat and ball, narrow escapes for first-class counties against lesser opposition and finally a controversy involving two sides who would be among the favourites to win the competition.

The ruling that Worcestershire fielded an ineligible player in the match against Gloucestershire means they must replay on Tuesday - although the ECB has said the stats will not be struck from the records. The winners play Leicestershire 24-hours later.

The other seven fourth round ties are clear cut - and they throw up some mouth-watering possibilities with 15 counties now just three matches away from a trip to Lord's.

One-day specialists Lancashire have the benefit of a home draw in round four and will be favourites to progress against Essex at Old Trafford.

John Crawley's side have a host of experienced players in their ranks with potential match winners Mike Atherton and Neil Fairbrother, although there is a fitness doubt over all-rounder Andrew Flintoff.

Add the sublime talents of Indian Test star Sourav Ganguly to the mix and the Red Rose county have a line-up which is among the best in the country.


Elsewhere, Yorkshire will be hoping to end their 13-year wait for some silverware, but face a testing trip to Northamptonshire.

Shane Warne, who lifted the World Cup with Australia on a recent visit to Lord's, has a great chance to continue on the road to the home of cricket as Hampshire take on Durham.

In the remaining matches, Warwickshire with Allan Donald play host to Dominic Cork's Derbyshire and Middlesex try to revive their season against last year's NatWest Trophy runners-up Somerset.

Rahul Dravid carries Kent's hopes against improving Glamorgan. Starstudded Surrey's clash against Sussex will be live on Channel 4 TV.

Before that Worcestershire and Gloucestershire meet to settle their third round tie with the outcome likely to be just as close as last time.

Second chance for Trophy holders

Worcestershire Gloucestershire must replay Gloucestersine must represent their third round tie, but the stats will stay in the record books and that's good news for players who put in some superb performances.

Wicketkeeper Jack Russell, who made 84, and opener Rob Cunliffe (69) shared a second-wicket stand of 109 to lead NatWest Trophy holders Gloucestershire to a total of 211-8.

They then reduced the hosts to 68-4, but it was always going to be a difficult score to defend.


Cornish rookie Ryan Driver (61) shared a fifth-wicket stand of 89 with David Leatherdale (53) to get Worcestershire back on course, and they eventually reached their target with seven balls to spare.

The only other all-first class county clash saw captain Justin Langer score exactly 100 to set up Middlesex's 128-run victory over Nottinghamshire at Lord's.

Australian star Langer shared a second-wicket stand of 115 with Andrew Strauss (56) after under-pres-England opener . Mark Ramprakash had been dismissed for just five by new international one-day recruit Paul Franks

That helped the hosts to 274-5, but Notts could only muster 146 in reply as Aaron Laraman polished off the tail to return figures of 4-39.

Warwickshire came closest to suffering an upset in the remaining ties as they allowed the Essex Board to within 11 runs of their modest 214-8 at Billericay.

The county side were grateful for an unbeaten 45 from Trevor Penney to boost their total as the hosts then made it to 203-8 in reply, helped by opener Nick Carlier's 56.

Shropshire also made a fight of it before losing to Somerset by 27 runs at Telford.

Somerset opener Marcus Trescothick struck 87 to lead his side to 262-6, and Shropshire then made it to 235-9 inspired by Jamie Ralph's unbeaten 102.

Essex were indebted to a fifth-wicket stand of 84 between Stephen Peters (58) and captain Ronnie Irani (45) to reach 154 all out against Wales, who were then all out for just 51 to lose by 103 runs at Swansea.

Durham successfully defended a modest 140 to win by 43 runs as Melvyn Betts picked up 4-34 to help dismiss Berkshire for just 97 at Finchampstead.

The county side had earlier been restricted by 47-year-old former England off-spinner John Emburey's economical figures of 9.4-3-13-4.

Michael di Venuto lashed an unbeaten 173 off 152 balls - the highest one-day score by a Derbyshire batsman - and captain Dominic Cork contributed 93 off 77 deliveries in a massive 356-2.

That enabled them to beat their own Board XI by 223 runs, Ian Darlington's 58 only delaying the inevitable as the recreational side were restricted to

Glamorgan's openers shared a record stand of 246 while both making career-best one-day scores, with Matthew Elliott hitting 156 and Keith Newell reaching 129 in a total of 333-4 against Dorset at Dean Park.

That led to a 139-run victory for the Welsh county, who were only held up by an eighth-wicket stand worth 82 between Martin Miller (81) and Vyv Pike (45) as Darren Thomas claimed 4-27 to help dismiss the hosts for 194.

Kristian Adams claimed a careerbest 6-24 as Kent dismissed Cumberland for 140, and the visitors went on to win by six wickets at Carlisle where Rahul Dravid's 54 guided them towards their target.

Alec Stewart finished unbeaten on 70, and there were also useful knocks from Alistair Brown (59) and Graham Thorpe (46 not out) as Surrey romped to an eight-wicket triumph over Devon.

The minor county had been restricted to 194-6, which included a fourthwicket century stand between David Lye (56) and Matt Wood (43) at Exmouth.

Dimitri Mascarenhas claimed three wickets and then struck an unbeaten 67 as Hampshire eased to an eightwicket victory over the Kent Board at Canterbury.

The Kent XI had slumped from 76 without loss to 149 all out as Shane Warne got among their tailenders to claim 4-34

Lancashire's Indian star Sauray Ganguly struck an unbeaten 120 off 98 balls and shared an unbroken stand of 193 with Michael Atherton (52no) as his team romped past Lincolnshire's 190-9 in a 10-wicket win at Cleethorpes.

Billy Taylor picked up a career oneday best of 4-26 as Sussex dismissed the Middlesex Board for 153 and went on to win by nine wickets at Southgate. Openers Chris Adams and Richard Montgomerie both completed half-centuries for the first-class side.

Kumble's 5-27 Leicestershire a comfortable 226-run victory as Northumberland were all out for 102 at Jesmond.

Leicestershire had overcome Steve Foster's 6-52 to amass 328-9, Darren Stevens leading the way on 133 after captain Vince Wells made 60.

Michael Vaughan showed he is gearing up for a return to the England Test team with a top score of 70 in Yorkshire's 240-5 at Harrogate against their Board XI, who were all out for 110 as Darren Gough claimed 5-30.

Northamptonshire captain Matthew Hayden struck an unbeaten 77 as his side beat the Durham Board by eight wickets after dismissing them for 167 at Riverside.

IT was always potentially the tie of the third round, and it made its mark in more ways than one.

The result was in doubt until the penultimate over, and then Worcestershire's celebrations were short-lived as it emerged that Kabir Ali played for the Board XI in a previous round.

Both sides may feel aggrieved by the decision to order a replay, but it could have gone either way and this at least gives both them another chance. After their recent one-day cup final triumph, Gloucestershire are fancied by some to repeat last season's double Lord's success.

They will once again be looking to their own Australian import lan Harvey to assist their cause.

His all-round skills have been a major factor in their emergence as a one day force to be reckoned with and his contributions

Players to watch

- An extremely-talented batsman, Graeme Hick has proved his worth in limited overs cricket recently with several outstanding innings for both county and country. An attacking batsman, who has a wide range of strokes, Hick can also bowl some useful offspin which can be telling in the one-day game. He is also a superb slip fielder but in limited overs cricket he will be found in the outfield, where his excellent throwing arm can save vital runs.
- Gloucestershire's very own captain marvel, Mark Alleyne has been instrumental in his county's successful run in the limited overs game. More than capable with both bat and ball, Alleyne has managed to get into the habit of making match-winning performances. A tactically-astute captain and a more than useful fielder, who will often perform spectacular feats on the pitch.

could be crucial to the outcome of the match.

But Worcestershire are certainly no mugs when it comes to the one day game so this again promises to be an entertaining affair.

Worcestershire boast a formidable line-up and, with home advantage, will be confident of again sealing a morale-boosting victory

The New Road side finished second in the National League First Division last season and will be anxious to improve on their performance in last season's NatWest competition, when they were knocked out by Surrey at the fourth round stage.

A tough match at Leicester awaits the winners just 24 hours later - but the side that worries too much about that match could well be the side that misses out. Motivation should not be a problem for a replay that will demand 100 per cent effort.

After the problems last time, particular attention will also be paid to team selection.

DURHAM have only had their blushes spared for their woeful one-day form by the equally poor run that Hampshire have endured this season and the sides meet in the north east for a place in the NatWest Trophy quarter-finals.

The home side were nearly the subject of the upset of the third round when they were up against Berkshire at Finchampstead.

After being dismissed for just 140, with 47-year-old former England bowler John Emburey Durham's chief tormentor with 4-13, Melvyn Betts bagged four wickets of his own as Berkshire were all out for 97.

It would have been the second successive upset for Durham as they had bowed out at the third round stage last year when they were

Players to watch

- Australian Simon Katich is a left hander blessed with a good eye and rich sense of timing that distinguishes the sport's more gifted batsmen. His ability to work the ball into gaps is superb and this is often crucial in the one-day game in order to keep the scoreboard ticking over. Katich took the Australian domestic scene by storm during the 1998-99 season when he scored 1039 runs and his reputation persuaded Durham to bring him into the English game. He is certain to play a crucial role in Durham's innings, batting in the number three slot where so many one-day matches can be won and lost.
- Probably the greatest leg spinner of all time, Shane Warne has dominated world cricket since his introduction to the game in the early 1990s. The Australian wizard has excelled in the one-day game as well as the Test arena and he was a key member of the Australian World Cup-winning side last year. Warne has the capability to turn a game with his huge variety of bowling options and he can also be a handy run-scorer when batting further down the order. Hampshire have a number of key performers within their ranks but there is little doubt that Warne represents the country's best chance of progressing further in this year's competition.

But, having ridden their luck and bounced back well in the last round, they will be confident of their chances of victory over Hampshire, especially if they can make use of their home advantage.

Hampshire will have reasons of their own to be looking forward to their trip to Chester-le-Street after defeating Durham in the National League earlier in the season.

With both sides rooted to the bottom of the one-day league, Hampshire got the better of their opponents which should give them a slight psychological advantage going into the match.

Robin Smith's side also enjoyed a much smoother passage into the fourth round than Durham after their eight-wicket cruise against Kent's County Board side.

Hampshire's Australian star Shane Warne helped himself to four wickets in that victory and his performance will again be crucial to his side's chances of success.

After last season's heartbreaking fourth round exit at the hands of Lancashire by just one wicket, Hampshire will be eager to reach the quarter-finals and possibly go even further this time around.

TWO sides who will harbour serious hopes of gaining silverware from this year's NatWest Trophy meet at Northampton in a match that looks like going to the wire.

- Probably the world's premier fast bowler, Allan Donald has the capacity to strike fear into any batsmen. His international strike partnership with Shaun Pollock has been responsible for many devastating victories and he has a career best of 8-71 against Zimbabwe. He bowls with a smooth action and has the ability to bring the ball into a right hander as well as moving it away late. His 2-37 against the Essex Cricket Board in round three helped Warwickshire to an 11-run victory.
- Michael di Venuto. The Australian, who is playing his first season with Derbyshire, has earned a reputation as a crowd pleaser. With a championship average of 55.75 and a swashbuckling 173 not out against the Board XI in the last round, he is a batsman to watch. A fearsome player of the hook, pull and square cut, di Venuto is a dashing left-handed batsman. He treats every delivery with contempt which can make him frustrating when off-form, but awesome when on. He usually bats at No 3, but in one-day games is sometimes elevated to open the batting if quick runs are needed.

11-run victory against the Essex Cricket Board.

After struggling to 214-8 in their 50 overs, Warwickshire had to rely on the bowling of South African paceman Allan Donald and England's Ashley Giles, who took two wickets each as Essex CB were restricted to 203-8, despite looking on course for a shock victory at one stage.

Having escaped the ignominy of third round defeat, Warwickshire will be looking forward to the fourth round tie with confidence and hoping to erase the memory of last season's exit at this stage at the hands of Glamorgan.

In contrast Derbyshire, who have struggled in the one-day game this season, cruised through the third round encounter against their own Board XI with a mammoth 223 run win.

A century by Australian sensation Michael di Venuto helped Derbyshire to a huge total of 356-2 in their 50 overs, before tight bowling by Kevin Dean and former England test player Tim Munton restricted the home side to just 133-9.

But they too will be hoping to avoid a repeat of last season's fourth round exit, an eight-wicket thrashing at the hands of Gloucestershire, and can look forward to visiting Edgbaston with renewed confidence.

A POWERFUL Lancashire side, boasting a host of internationals, will be looking to take advantage of Essex's current troubles when the teams meet at Old Trafford in the fourth round of the NatWest Trophy.

The two teams had contrasting victories in the last round against two of the minnows of the game.

Lancashire, with the likes of Mike Atherton, Andrew Flintoff and Sourav Ganguly in the side, powered to a 10-wicket victory against Lincolnshire in the last round, with a sensational innings by the Indian Test star.

Player to watch

- Widely regarded as the greatest Indian left-handed batsman of all time Sourav Ganguly has a superb Test average of over 50. He brings a blend of elegance and power to his batting, but in the one-day game he often shows a murderous contempt for bowlers, much to the delight of spectators. His performance in the third round defeat of Lincolnshire saw him bludgeon 120 runs off just 98 balls as he and Mike Atherton shared a club record one-day opening stand to guide the team to a 10-wicket victory.
- Ronnie Irani. The new Essex captain has had a mixed career on the international stage. The all-rounder first worked his way into the England team for the 1996 Texaco series against India, scoring a quickfire 37 in his first appearance. But his right-arm medium pace bowling let him down and he was dropped. He won his place back on the tour of New Zealand and Zimbabwe before spending two long years in the wilderness. Last season's form saw him again earn his England place back in the final test against New Zealand. This year he has an impressive average of 70.25 in the county championship.

After restricting Lincolnshire to 190-9 in their 50 overs, Ganguly, who had taken three wickets with his medium pace bowling, took charge blasting 120 runs off 98 balls as he and former England captain Mike Atherton guided the team past the victory target with ease.

Lancashire, who are currently well placed in the County Championship race after finishing runners-up last year, will be hoping to go further than last year's quarter-final appearance in the NatWest Trophy when they lost to Yorkshire.

Essex's passage to the fourth round was far more tense and at one point looked like producing one of the tournament's biggest upsets

At 14-4 after 11 overs they looked set for defeat at the hands of Wales, but skipper Ronnie Irani and Stephen Peters steadied the ship and dragged the team to 154 all out and a defendable target.

But with a chance of a lifetime in their hands the Welsh fell apart and three wickets apiece for Irani and Mark llott saw the home side dismissed for an embarrassingly low total of 51.

Essex have already gone one better than last year when they crashed to a five-wicket defeat at the hands of Northants.

His Test debut followed a year later but he has been unable to secure a regular spot since, making him available for the majority of Middlesex's matches.
- Marcus Trescothick. The Somerset opener has been in fine form this season and was in the frame for a place in the England squads which played Zimbabwe earlier this summer. Although only 24, the Somerset-born left-hander is something of a county cricket veteran he made his first-class debut at the tender age of 17. Trescothick was tipped to as a future England prospect almost from the start but he failed to live-up to his early promise for many years thanks to some inconsistent performances. A good season last year, however, earned him a spot on the England A tour to Bangladesh and New Zealand.

GLAMORGAN will be looking to brush aside Kent to move a step closer to a second Lord's final this season when the two sides meet at Canterbury in the fourth round of the NatWest Trophy.

After losing the one cup final to Gloucestershire already this season, Glamorgan are out to reinforce their position as one-day specialists.

The Welshmen eased comfortably into the fourth round with a 139-run victory over Dorset.

Keith Newell and Australian star Matthew Elliott both blasted centuries as Glamorgan racked up a total of 333-4 in their 50 overs, before their bowlers finished off the job by dismissing the home side for 194

Player to watch

- Rahul Dravid is one of the main pillars of Indian Test batting, known for his technical proficiency and stylish strokeplay. He has proved a big hit with the Kent fans with a first-class average of 78.83 and a highest score of 182. He was the top batsman in the 1999 World Cup, scoring two centuries, and has a Test average of over 50. Nicknamed 'The Wall', Dravid has worked hard on his batting to become as assured in the one-day game as he is in the Test arena. A confident knock of 54 helped Kent ease past the part-timers of Cumberland in the third round.
- Matthew Elliott. The young Australian is regarded as one of the most talented contemporary batsmen in his country. He makes batting look ridiculously uncomplicated and is a strong driver of the ball. He plays with incredible fluency and is particularly strong through the off-side. In 1997 he was named as one of Wisden's Five Cricketers of the Year, but a habit of getting himself run out put paid to his Test career and he is still struggling to re-establish himself. He blasted 156 runs in the demolition of Dorset round three.

The one-day competitions have proved a blessed relief from the slog of the county championship for Glamorgan. They are currently struggling in Division One and are facing a battle to avoid relegation.

Kent, another team who could do with a change in their county championship fortunes, also had a comfortable passage into the fourth round with a six-wicket win over Cumberland.

Despite a swashbuckling 65 runs from home batsmen Martin Lewis, the part-timers were dismissed for 140 thanks to six wickets from Kristian Adams.

Indian star Rahul Dravid hit 54 as Kent eased past the victory target with six wickets and 11 overs to spare

LEICESTERSHIRE lie in wait for the winners of the replayed third round tie between Worcestershire and Gloucestershire, but it remains to be seen whether that will give them an advantage.

Jack Birkenshaw's team may benefit from the extra rest and preparation, but a schedule of two games on consecutive days is common enough and Tuesday's rearranged match could provide an opportunity for their opponents to play their way into match winning form and rising confidence.

Players to watch

- Leicestershire right-hander Ben Smith has hit a rich vein of one-day form this season. His performances in Division One of the National League have been superb, securing him a high position in the batting averages. The 28-year-old topped his county's batting averages for the National League last season and also gave a good account of himself in the County Championship. He has the ability to build a match-winning innings and could give the visiting bowlers a torrid time.
- As competitive as they come, Glenn McGrath is one of the finest fast bowlers in the world and has been a star performer for Worcestershire in one-day cricket this season. The Australian test star has the invaluable ability to extract bounce from any wicket and can bowl at a ferocious pace. One of his finest performances, and perhaps the one most memorable to cricket fans in this country, was his spell of 8-38 against England at Lord's in 1997.
- His international career may be over but the evergreen Jack Russell remains a force in the domestic game. His ability behind the stumps - and in front of them with bat in hand - was a significant factor in Gloucestershire's double cup success last season. With a catch, a stumping and a top score of 84 in the third round tie that never was he showed a continuing enthusiasm for the game. That will be further sharpened by the need for a replay.

Concentration may be the issue in the replay. Worcestershire thought they had won the match and now have to do it all again. Gloucestershire will be doing all they can to grab this unlikely second chance to hold onto the NatWest Trophy that crowned such a superb one-day season last year.

Leicestershire's passage into the fourth round of the tournament was a stroll by any standards. They hammered Northumberland by a massive margin of 226 runs as they over-ran the Minor Counties side in every department of the game.

Darren Stevens was in top form with bat, smashing 133 to help his team to a daunting total of 328. And there was no respite for Northumberland when they went into bat, Anil Kumble decimating their ranks with five cheap wickets.

Last season Leicestershire fell at the fourth round stage against Yorkshire at Headingley, but the home draw gives them an excellent chance of reaching the quarter finals.

He excluded himself from the England tour to South Africa over Christmas and the New Year, but is back in the fold for the triangular one-day tournament against Zimbabwe and West Indies. Thorpe has earned his recall after again showing what a talented player he is with some eye-catching displays on the county circuit. His fielding is also sharp, making him an invaluable part of the team.
- Sussex vice-captain Michael Bevan is one of the most devastating one-day batsmen in the world and is a vital cog in the Australian limited-overs side. And he has had little problem emulating this success on the English county circuit this season his National League performances have seen him dominate the averages list. Coming in at number four, Bevan is a great source of runs for Sussex and strengthens the middle order. His running between the stumps is very quick and this gives him the ability to keep the scoreboard ticking over late in an innings. The former Yorkshire player can also turn his hand to left-arm spin, although his length has at times been found wanting at the highest level.

THE DUCKWORTH/LEWIS SYSTEM MADE SIMPLE

All NatWest Trophy matches have a reserve day, but if play is still lost to the weather the Duckworth Lewis system can be used to reset targets. The system is based on what percentage of its resources (overs and wickets) a team have left

With 50 overs left and 10 wickets remaining, a team has 100 per cent of its resources left. The table shows the percentage of resources at other stages in the innings.

The procedure for working out targets is as follows:

- 1) For each innings: Use the table to calculate the resource percentage lost by the interruption and therefore calculate the resource percentage still available.
- 2) If team 2 have less resources available than team 1, calculate the ratio of the resources available to both teams. Team 2's revised target is obtained by scaling down team 1's score by this ratio.
- 3) If team 2 have more resources available than team 1, calculate the amount by which team 2's resources exceeds team 1's. Work this out as a percentage of 225 (the average 50-over score in ECB matches and one-day internationals). This gives the extra runs to add to team 1's score to give team 2's target.
