

# Win or bust for Stewart's side

AUSTRALIA and Pakistan are romping towards The NatWest Series final - and England are already drinking in the last-chance saloon.

Anything other than two comprehensive victories against the Aussies and another big win against Pakistan will leave the hosts watching the 2001 Lord's final on TV. Alec Stewart's men have suffered a double dose of heartbreak so far, with the Aussies squeezing past England's 268 total at Bristol on Sunday - and Waqar Younis' side triumphing in the high-pressure last-over showdown at Lord's on Tuesday.

England duo Marcus Trescothick and Owais Shah shored up the home response with a wonderful fourth-wicket stand of 170. But, just when it seemed England were on course to smash their awful run of seven successive one-day international defeats, disaster struck.

A flurry of wickets left Stewart's men needing nine from the final over with two wickets still standing. Trescothick was caught attempting a massive six and Andy Caddick was stumped off the final delivery as he tried to smash the ball out of the ground.

Now England and Australia go head-tohead in what promises to be an exhilarating day-night encounter at Old Trafford. Victory for the Aussies would dump England out of The NatWest Series and stretch their unwanted string of defeats to nine games.

Australia captain Steve Waugh has called on his side to improve their bowling attack as they prepare to face the hosts.

Waugh also reserved praise for Ricky Ponting, who blasted 102 from 116 balls against England at the weekend.

He said: "We are certainly not bowling as well as we'd like - batting-wise we've played very well in both games.

"(Against England) Ricky Ponting played superbly, kept the tempo going and controlled the innings."



# **ENGLAND PAKISTAN**



#### 12th June at Lord's

#### Pakistan beat England by 2 runs

Series victory at Lord's. England began the last over with two wickets

in hand, needing nine runs to surpass Pakistan's total of 242 for eight - but Saqlain Mushtaq showed his expertise by claiming the final wicket of Andrew Caddick from the last delivery of the match.

England's cause had seemed lost after losing five wickets in six overs to leave them needing a further 27 from the remaining three overs as Caddick walked out to the crease to join centurion Marcus Trescothick. They began chiselling down Pakistan's advantage until they reached that final, dramatic over from Saqlain with Trescothick needing just four runs to overtake Viv Richards' 138 against England in 1975 and score the highest ever one-day innings at Lord's.

Trescothick added two more to his total before he attempted to take advantage of a Saqlain delivery by hitting a slog-sweep which flew high in the air towards mid-wicket with both Shahid Afridi and Shoaib Malik converging on a possible catch.

Afridi arrived first and held it superbly despite colliding with Shoaib to end Trescothick's brilliant 142-ball innings of 137, which included three sixes and 11 other boundaries.

Caddick added a further single before a major flashpoint when umpire Ken Palmer, involved in a major row with Pakistan fast bowler Aquib Javed at Old Trafford in 1992 after warning him for intimidating bowling, called yet another wide and prompted captain Waqar Younis, wicketkeeper Rashid Latif and Saglain to remonstrate forcibly.

Instead of losing his concentration for the final two deliveries, however, Saqlain delivered brilliantly with a dot ball yorker off the next ball before having Caddick stumped by Rashid off the last to complete Pakistan's stunning triumph.

#### **Marcus Trescothick**

"It wasn't actually until I came off that I realised I had scored a hundred at Lord's.

"It was quite an amazing thing from a personal point of view. It didn't really dawn on me until I was out. I didn't make a big issue of it while I was batting but it's nice to get my first one-day hundred out of the way.

"It just went the wrong way at the end of the day. It can happen like that and obviously we're disappointed. It makes our chances of qualifying for the final very slim. We've got to win all our three games by quite big margins."

#### Wagar Younis

"It was a great game of cricket. Two teams played really well, especially Trescothick - a magnificent innings.

"I was very happy with the run-outs and the fielding. It was magic.

"Our guys played really well, especially Yousuf Youhana and Younis Khan. We really needed a partnership, and the bowling supported it.

"In the last over, Saglain kept his nerve and got Trescothick's wicket which was the vital one. It was a great catch by Shahid Afridi and it gave us the game.

#### NatWest Man of the Match

Marcus Trescothick took England to the brink of victory with a quite marvellous 137. He stayed calm as wickets tumbled around him - then teamed up with Owais Shah to amass 170 for the fourth wicket. Trescothick took just 142 balls to rack up his huge total, claiming his first ton in a one-day international. The Somerset opener needed just two more runs to pass Sir Viv Richards' knock of 138 against England in 1975 and score the highest ever one-day innings at Lord's. Trescothick was finally sent back to the pavilion when Shahid Afridi took a brilliant catch in the final over.





# **ENGLAND AUSTRALIA**



#### 14th June at Old Trafford

Marcus Trescothick has told his team-mates to keep cool in frantic one-day international finishes going into England's must-win showdown with Australia at Old Trafford.

Alec Stewart's side know a place in The NatWest Series final at Lord's on June 23 will be beyond them unless they record comprehensive victories in their final three matches. Somerset left-hander Trescothick hit a magnificent 137 against Pakistan, the highest one-day score of his career, but could not prevent England slumping to a heart-breaking two-run defeat.

It was the second successive close finish in which England have ended up as the losing side, following Sunday's defeat by Australia with just three balls remaining.

If England are to succeed in their unlikely objective of reaching the final, they must first find a formula which prevents them losing their nerve at crucial stages. This was underlined at Lord's when they lost seven wickets for 44 runs off 60 balls - en route to being dismissed for 240 off the final ball chasing Pakistan's 242 for eight.

Trescothick said: "Myself and Owais (Shah) put on a partnership and almost sealed a win - we just had to finish it off, but fell at the last hurdle. "We just need somebody to come in at that stage and finish it off and stay with the dominant partner. It just needs someone to slot into that role.'

Australia rested world number one batsman Michael Bevan for the first meeting with England. They should be even stronger at Old Trafford, with Jason Gillespie and Damien Fleming expected to return from hamstring and calf injuries respectively.

Captain Steve Waugh said: "We've won four in a row now, two from India and two here. It sets our goals - we want to keep winning consistently. "We believe whatever 11 we put out on the park, it's as good as the next one and there are no exceptions to that rule.'

#### **Key Players**

#### **Owais Shah**

Just as Marcus Trescothick was England's find of 2000, Owais Shah has already impressed hugely in his first two international outings. In the narrow defeat against Pakistan at Lord's, Shah cracked 62 runs in a superb 170-run fourth-wicket partnership with Trescothick. He made an unbeaten 28 against Australia at Bristol on his debut, and Steve Waugh's men will be wary of his threat as the sides meet again under the lights at Old Trafford.

#### Glenn McGrath

The Australia paceman terrorised English batsmen as he spearheaded the Worcestershire bowling attack in last season's County Championship - and he plans to wreak more havoc against Alec Stewart's side. McGrath bagged two for 22 as the Aussies strolled to a seven-wicket victory against Pakistan at Cardiff on Saturday. He also secured the crucial wicket of Alistair Brown in the first meeting with England - and will be keen to finally extinguish England's faint hopes of reaching The NatWest Series final.

#### **Weather Outlook**

Mostly dry with some sunny intervals and just the odd rogue shower for most of the day. However, it will cloud over later in the afternoon, with rain threatening by evening. Temperatures will reach a high of 19C (66F), and there will be just a light south-easterly

#### **How It Works**

- O All matches will consists of one innings per side and each innings will be limited to 50 overs. A minimum of 25 overs per team shall constitute a match
- O Matches shall be of one day's scheduled duration with the exception of the final, for which a reserve day has been allocated in case of weather interruption.
- O In matches without a reserve day there is provision for for up to 60 minutes of extra official playing time in day matches and and up to 30 minutes in floodlit matches to make up for time lost
- O Play is scheduled to start at 10.45am with an interval of 45 minutes at 2.15pm and close of play at 6.30pm
- O At floodlit matches play is scheduled to start at 2.30pm with an interval of 45 minutes at 6pm and close of play at 10.15pm.
- O Two drinks intervals, each one hour and 10 minutes apart, are permitted for each innings.
- O Where play is delayed or interrupted the umpires will reduce the length of the interval between innings. If up to 60 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 30 minutes. If between 60 and 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 20 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 20 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 10 minutes. O In games without a reserve day there is provision for up to 60 minutes of extra playing time for day matches and 30 minutes for floodlit matches. O If the innings of the team batting first is completed prior to the scheduled time for the interval.

  O For the first 15 overs only two fieldsmen are permitted to be outside the field restriction marking at the instant of delivery. This restriction will be

  O No bowler shall bowl more than 10 overs in an
- O No bowler shall bowl more than 10 overs in an innings. In a delayed or interrupted match where the overs are reduced no bowler may bowl more than one-fifth of the total overs allowed.
- O A no ball will be called for short-pitched bowling. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.
- O Umpires have been instructed to apply a very strict and consistent interpretation in calling wides. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored
- O In line with the ICC Code of Conduct, fines may be imposed for slow over rates.
- O Teams will play each other three times in the group stage and score two points for a win and one point for a tie or no result.
- O If the scores in a match are level the result shall be a tie and no account shall be taken of the number of wickets that have fallen.
- O The top two teams in the group will contest the final. In the event of teams finishing on equal points the right to play in the final will be decided according to:

The most wins in the group matches;

The team that won the most matches between the tied sides;

The team with the higher run rate;

The team that has taken the higher number of wickets per balls;

In the event that teams are still level they will draw lots.

#### The Duckworth Lewis System

IF matches are rain-affected the Duckworth Lewis system is used to reset targets. The system is based on what percentage of its resources (overs and wickets) a team have left. With 50 overs left and 10 wickets remaining, a team has 100 per cent of its resources left. The table shows the percentage of resources at other stages in the innings.

The procedure for working out targets is as follows:

- 1) For each innings: Use the table to calculate the resource percentage lost by the interruption and therefore calculate the resource percentage still available.
- 2) If team 2 have less resources available than team 1, calculate the ratio of the resources available to both teams. Team 2's revised target is obtained by scaling down team 1's score by this ratio.
- 3) If team 2 have more resources available than team 1, calculate the amount by which team 2's resources exceeds team 1's.

Work this out as a percentage of 225 (the average 50-over score in ECB matches and one-day internationals). This gives the extra runs to add to team score to give team 2's target.
